



Why are we HERE?





Why are we HERE?

- 1829: Captain James
 Stirling founded Perth as part of the Swan River
 Colony
- Stirling thought the natural environment around Perth was "as beautiful as anything of this kind I had ever witnessed" and advocated that a colony be established here

Why are we HERE? Copied from the first Authoritic Flan of Porth in Jupil of Lands & Survings Western Australia


Colonial Draftsman A. Hillman's **1838** plan for Perth shows the wetlands that existed at the time


 For the first time in history, the majority of the human population resides within urban areas, with over 3 billion people living in cities across the world

Challenges identified for the Environment under the State Planning Strategy 2050:

Avoiding and minimising further loss of biodiversity is complex because it involves taking action to manage:

- all forms of pollution;
- the impacts of climate change and natural hazards (flooding and bushfire);
- land clearing that results in habitat loss;
- environmental degradation, salinity and erosion;
- predation and displacement by introduced species;
- weed infestation; and
- plant and animal diseases.
